Trustees' Annual Report

for the year ended 31 March 2015

The trustees, who are also the directors for Companies Act purposes, are pleased to present their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2015.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Articles of Association, s.419(2) of the Companies Act 2006, "Small Companies' Regime" and with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2005.

The period covered by this annual report has been one of stabilisation, consolidation and renewal of purpose at Horsecross Arts. The board is extremely pleased to report an operating surplus for 2014-15 with Gwilym Gibbons, our new chief executive, firmly in place to lead the operation through the next phase of its development.

Structure, governance and management

Structure

Horsecross Arts Limited ("Horsecross Arts") was incorporated on 25 April 2006 as a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital. Following an Extraordinary Members' Meeting in March 2013, new Articles of Association were adopted whereby Perth & Kinross Council became the sole member of the company. The Articles were last amended by a member's special resolution dated 14 October 2013.

A board of up to twelve individuals, acting in a voluntary capacity, carry fiduciary responsibility for safeguarding the assets of the charity, as trustees and directors. Perth & Kinross Council has the power under the Articles to nominate up to three Elected Members of the Council for appointment to the board.

Current governance arrangements

Following amendment to the Articles in October 2013, Perth & Kinross Council has powers of appointment and removal of all directors, as well as the power to appoint and remove the Chair of the board. The foregoing powers are only to be exercised by Perth & Kinross Council in exceptional circumstances, in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding which sets out the terms of the arm's length relationship between the council and the charity. OSCR has been consulted on the arrangements.

The board meets up to six times a year. Observers from Perth & Kinross Council and Creative Scotland are invited to, and receive papers for, all board meetings.

Working sub-groups may be convened from time to time, in accordance with the Articles, to deal with matters reserved to the board. Currently there are three sub-groups covering: financial and other resource planning, artistic policy and direction, catering operations.

- Trustee selection, induction and training

New trustees receive briefing materials covering their legal obligations under charity and company law, including OSCR's published guidance on trustee responsibilities. They are provided with a copy of the Articles of Association, the business plan and recent financial performance of the charity. Arrangements are made to introduce new trustees to key employees and other trustees as soon as practicable after their appointment.

Operational management

The day-to-day running of the charity is delegated to a Chief Executive, supported by an extended management team.

Sources of finance

Core funding is provided through grants and service level agreements with Perth and Kinross Council. Horsecross Arts also receives regular revenue funding from Creative Scotland. The Creative Scotland regular funding agreement was renewed during the year, but at a significantly lower level for the three year period from 2015-16 to 2017-18, during which time Perth Theatre will remain closed while it undergoes redevelopment.

As well as its primary purpose charitable trading and other activities for generating funds, the charity carries on a catering business through its wholly owned subsidiary, Perth Theatre Catering Services Limited, whose results are consolidated with those of the charity in the accounts.

Risk management

The main risks, to which the charity is exposed, as identified by the trustees, are reviewed periodically throughout the year. The trustees seek to put in place effective measures to manage those risks.

The risk register was last reviewed by the board on 11 May 2015. The board has identified control measures and specific actions required to mitigate the critical risks identified and is satisfied that those measures, once implemented, will reduce the potential impact of the critical risks to manageable levels.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the company are recognised as being charitable in purpose and are set out in the Articles of Association. They are:

- (1) To advance education by the encouragement of the performing arts by means of production, presentation, collection, exhibition, collaboration, education and training in performing arts; and
- (2) To run arts development and arts education programmes in theatre, music and new media public art in Perth and elsewhere which will promote and encourage creativity, skills development, social and personal development, social inclusion and lifelong learning but only as long as such activities are regarded as charitable in law.

The trustees confirm they have complied with section 4 of the Charities Act 2006, having given due regard to the guidance in relation to public benefit. The trustees are content that the various community programmes which Horsecross Arts runs at subsidy and an accessible policy in regard to ticket pricing demonstrate that Horsecross Arts satisfies the public benefit criteria for charitable status.

Main aims & strategies for their achievement

Horsecross Arts uses core funding to support the delivery of creative learning and community outreach activities for people of all ages and backgrounds and a diverse, year-round programme of high quality theatre, music and comedy events which appeal to a broad spectrum of tastes and interests.

The over-riding aim is to make a substantial positive difference to the cultural life of the city of Perth and its outlying areas, as well as to contribute a positive economic impact, provide amenity to people who live and work in Perth and maintain an attractive cultural offer in support of long-term ambitions to build on Perth's appeal as a tourist destination.

Project funding is used to further enhance the organisation's capacity to engage people of all ages and backgrounds in creative expression. Details of projects funded with special grants and donations during the year are set out in note 17 to the financial statements.

Perth Concert Hall is a multi-purpose facility. As well as hosting performances by visiting artists and touring companies from all over the world, the facilities are also offered to local schools' and other amateur performing societies, public and third sector organisations, national trade associations, businesses and other corporate bodies looking for high quality conference facilities and meeting spaces. The revenues from this strand of activity, together with event-related and public catering, are used to support Horsecross Arts' primary charitable purposes.

Achievements and performance

The board's main priority during the year was to return the organisation to stability following a period of significant financial pressure and major change at board and senior management level.

In an operating period during which Perth Theatre was de-commissioned in anticipation of a major refurbishment project, the board is pleased to have overseen the successful continuation of a full and broadranging cultural and creative learning programme at Perth Concert Hall, and further afield, and the achievement of a financial surplus.

Cultural programme

In the year to 31 March 2015 we attracted total audiences of 112,500 (2014 – 115,600) to a total of 286 (2014-328) performances presented across a broad range of programming strands at Perth Concert Hall and at other venues, locally and on tour across Scotland. Looking at each of our main creative strands, the highlights of another busy year are summarised in the sections that follow.

Classical music

The Perth Concert Series remained at the core of our classical programme, featuring performances of major composer works by the SCO, the BBCSSO and the RSNO. We also presented work by Hebrides Ensemble and the Scottish Ensemble and hosted successful performances by Perth Symphony Orchestra and Perth Choral Society, as well as welcoming ensembles from the National Youth Orchestras of Scotland and the National Youth Choir of Scotland.

In April 2014 we were thrilled to present the world premiere of James MacMillan's *The Rumoured Seed* performed by the King's Singers, a performance which attracted a 5-star review in *The Herald* and continued our close relationship with Scotland's leading composer.

We continued our Perth Piano Sunday afternoon concerts throughout the year with performances by Denis Kozhukhin, Alasdair Beatson and Steven Osborne, amongst others, as well as featuring James Baillieu in three concerts broadcast by BBC Radio 3. Our popular one hour lunchtime concerts also continued, including performances from Hebrides Ensemble and SCO.

Early Music featured strongly with visits from Gramophone Award Winners Vox Luminis and performances of Handel's Messiah and Bach's St Matthew Passion by fellow Gramophone Award Winners Dunedin Consort. English Touring Opera brought their acclaimed production of Mozart's Magic Flute to Perth Concert Hall as part of the Perth International Festival of the Arts in May 2014, a performance complemented in January 2015 by a well-received semi-staged version of Mozart's The Marriage of Figaro by the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

Non-classical music, comedy, family shows and variety acts

Despite on-going financial constraints, we managed to offer a few experimental events alongside a contemporary programme with strong popular appeal. The former included the sumptuous *King Of Ghosts* featuring sarod player Soumik Datta and the Scotlish Chamber Orchestra, guitarist Graeme Stephen's live soundtrack to the original vampire movie *Nosferatu*, and a superb performance of their acclaimed Fringe show by avant-garde Perthshire duo *Pumajaw*.

The mainstream programme included visits from the *Ullimate Eagles*, *Snow White On Ice*, *Strictly Come Dancing*'s Brendan Cole, the *Simon and Garfunkel Story*, *10cc*, Joan Armatrading and Kate Rusby amongst others. Our comedy strand was exceptionally strong with Billy Connolly, Sarah Millican, Alan Davies, Ross Noble, Omid Djalili, Jimmy Carr, Dylan Moran, Alan Carr and Stewart Lee making for a high profile and eclectic line-up.

Traditional music remained a key part of our programme with local fiddler Patsy Reid filling the Norie Miller Studio and Dougie MacLean's *Perthshire Amber* festival extended over two well-attended shows in the Concert Hall. Likewise, the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra and Phil Cunningham's *Christmas Songbook* are now firmly established as annual fixtures. In August 2014, Ian McCalman's *Far, Far From Ypres* powerfully commemorated the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the Great War.

The Red Hot Chilli Pipers produced a great night as part of the Ryder Cup weekend programme, put together with support from Perth & Kinross Council. That event, and shows with The Springsteen Sessions and Big Countr, afforded another opportunity to present local artists on the big stage, with Mad Ferret, The New Madrids and The Holy Ghosts opening the shows. Performances by other local artists included two memorable nights in February 2015 with Lesley Mackie and Alex Yellowlees in An Evening in Paris, followed by a very well-attended show from local country rockers Red Pine Timber Company.

Our seventh Southern Fried Festival featured an outdoor stage programme for the first time, made possible with support from Perth & Kinross Council. We were extremely gratified that the quality of the line-up

(headlined by Buffy Sainte-Marie, Rosanne Cash and Steve Earle on consecutive nights), and the positive experience of festival-goers, was recognised at the Scotlish Event Awards in October 2014, where *Southern Fried* gained the *Best Small Festival* award.

- Drama

With the de-commissioning of Perth Theatre in preparation for an extended redevelopment period, a reduced scope theatre programme re-located to Perth Concert Hall, other venues in Perth and further afield.

Prior to its temporary shutdown, a number of final performances were hosted in the front of house and studio spaces of the theatre, including the premieres of *Face* by Peter Arnott and *Jacquoranda* by Alan Bissett. After short runs in Perth, these two companion piece monologues toured to pubs, hotels and other small venues across Perthshire under the *Cross-Country Stories* banner in the late spring of 2014.

The lack of a theatre did not prevent us from continuing to produce new drama or from bringing a range of interesting touring theatre work to Perth. In November 2014 we produced and presented *The Fundraiser*, by Lesley Hart, at Perth's historic Salutation Hotel and, in the spring of 2015, we toured to venues across Scotland with *And the Beat Goes On* by Stef Smith, co-produced in association with Random Accomplice.

With Perth Theatre closed, our traditional panto for 2014, *Sleeping Beauty*, transferred to Perth Concert Hall for a well-received fortnight's run of performances leading up to and including Boxing Day. We will continue to present our seasonal panto at Perth Concert Hall while Perth Theatre undergoes redevelopment.

Creative Learning

Our Join In and other schools and community-based programmes cover a wide range of creating learning activities for children and young people, as well as for adults.

We work in nurseries with early years' groups, as well as with students at all stages of primary, secondary and further education at schools and colleges in and around Perth. We have also been pioneering innovative arts education work with young people with autism.

The emphasis across all of our creative learning and community outreach work is on talent development and on helping young people, in particular, to build their self-confidence and attain proficiency in performance skills, theatre craft and creative practice and to allow them to explore possible career options in the creative industries.

We also seek to encourage people from all sections of the community and of all ages to take part for pure enjoyment, offering them access to the life-enhancing and social benefits that are reckoned increasingly to flow from participation in expressive arts activity, regardless of technical proficiency or aptitude.

Group sessions are generally delivered within a structured time-table across the year by professional tutors who are also skilled creative practitioners, or performers, in their own right. Our activities encompass our long-established and pioneering youth theatre groups, contemporary and street dance, and instrumental music, group and solo singing, with a particular emphasis on traditional Scottish and Gaelic forms.

A good deal of our creative learning activity is only made possible with the generous support of a wide range of funders and project partners for whose grants and other contributions we are extremely grateful. Further details of special project funds received and used during the year from trusts, public bodies and other grant-givers are given in note 17 to the financial statements.

Conferencing and catering trading operations

The primary business objective for conferencing and catering was to deliver a financial contribution in support of our primary charitable purposes.

Our conferencing and events business turnover for the year was £216.6k (2014 – £227.2k). The relative drop in turnover reflects a reduction in the number of conferences lasting for more than a single day compared to the previous year, indicative of a cyclical factor in booking patterns rather than a trend.

A detailed review of our catering business led to the implementation of a range of business improvement measures and the re-launch of our Glass Rooms café offer at Perth Concert Hall in Spring 2014. The board is pleased to report that management's efforts, with the support of the Catering sub-group, in re-shaping the catering subsidiary operation, have been rewarded by the achievement of an operating profit of £47.6k for the year.

Fund-raising

The board extends grateful thanks to all those individuals, trusts and corporate supporters who have contributed funds to a range of projects and general activities carried on at Perth Concert Hall and in the community during the year. Note 17 to the accounts gives details of the special projects we have been able to undertake with that support.

Special mention is due to Grassicks of Perth for its generous sponsorship of *Sleeping Beauty*, our first seasonal panto presentation at Perth Concert Hall - a commitment which generated Arts & Business matched funding.

There was obvious disappointment at the 30% cut made in our regular funding settlement from Creative Scotland, reflective of the temporary closure of Perth Theatre for major re-development during the period from 2015-16 to 2017-18. However, the board was delighted to receive final confirmation of Creative Scotland's Capital Lottery grant award of £2m towards the theatre re-development project - an award made jointly to Horsecross Arts and Perth & Kinross Council.

The in-house fund-raising and development team is being expanded in 2015-16 to build on and maintain the good progress made in 2014-15 through an on-going transition period, looking ahead to the re-opening of a redeveloped Perth Theatre in 2017-18.

Financial review

The year has seen a period of organisational stabilisation and re-purposing under the guidance of the board and an Interim Chief Executive who handed over to a new permanent Chief Executive, Gwilym Gibbons, in January 2015.

Total incoming group resources for the year were £4.080 million (2014 - £4.635 million) including restricted fund income of £196.3k (2014 - £143.0k). (Prior year incoming resources also include special grant assistance of £367k from Perth & Kinross Council which was included in general funds.)

The group operating surplus on general fund activities was £102.2k (2014 - £217.8k) after expenditure of £3.785 million (2013 - £4.128 million) and incoming fund transfers of £3.5k (2014 - £3.5k). (Prior year expenditure included exceptional costs of £152.4k). Group net assets at 31 March 2015 were £412.3k (2013

-£288.3k), of which £243.3k (2014 -£141.1k) relates to general funds (see note 18 to the financial statements).

The 30% cut in our regular funding grant from Creative Scotland which takes effect in 2015-16 has required a significant adjustment to near term operating budgets. However, the trustees believe that the operating surplus achieved in 2014-15, together with the core funding and other support from Perth & Kinross Council and Creative Scotland already in place for 2015-16, provides the organisation with a manageable basis on which to continue to develop its transitional plans under a new Chief Executive, while Perth Theatre undergoes redevelopment.

Perth Theatre Catering Services Ltd ("PTCS Ltd")

The results of the charity's wholly owned subsidiary company, PTCS Ltd, are consolidated with those of the charity in the group financial statements.

PTCS Ltd reported an operating profit for the year to 31 March 2015 of £47.6k (2014 – loss of £49.8k). (The prior year operating result reflected exceptional costs of £37.6k relating to the closure of Perth Theatre in January 2014 and the outcome of an impairment review carried out at 31 March 2014.)

Due to the availability of prior year tax losses, no provision has been made for a donation to the parent charity out of the trading profit reported for the year.

Reserves policy

Reserves are needed to bridge the gap between the spending and receiving of income, to cover unplanned emergency repairs and other expenditure, and to provide funds for long-term capital maintenance and artistic planning purposes. Advance box office sales provide short-term liquidity, but cannot be relied upon to provide secure reserves due to the uncertain nature of box office outcomes.

Based on a 3 months' net operating expenditure benchmark, a contingency fund of the order of £500k is suggested as being desirable at 31 March 2015. General reserves at this date are reported as £240k, with net current assets making up less than £50k of that amount. The trustees will continue to seek ways to build operating reserves over the medium term to nearer the 3 month operating expenditure benchmark.

In the meantime, given the inherent uncertainties associated with the organisation's charitable trading and voluntary fund-raising revenue model, the organisation will remain dependent on the continued support of its principal funders for core revenue stability.

Going concern

An overview of the key factors which the trustees have taken into account in assessing the organisation's ability to carry on as a going concern is set out in Note 1 to the Financial Statements.

Plans for future periods

The organisation is currently working its way through a transitional phase which continues into 2015-16, a year in which we look forward to celebrating the 10th anniversary of the opening of Perth Concert Hall with a series of special community participation events and performances planned for September 2015.

The board is committed to maintaining a stable financial position through 2015-16, while driving the *Transform Perth Theatre* project ahead in partnership with Perth & Kinross Council and with the valued support of Creative Scotland and our other project funders, including the Gannochy Trust, which has pledged £3m to the project.

The board will also be seeking to ensure the requisite support is in place for the new Chief Executive and his extended management learn as they carry on with the job of delivering a diverse, appealing and stimulating creative programme of cultural and community events at Perth Concert Hall and other venues through the year.

Statement of Trustee' Responsibilities

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In the case of each of the persons who are trustees at the time when the Trustee' Report is approved:

- each trustee has taken all the steps that he ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditor is aware of that information.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members and Trustees

We have audited the financial statements of Horsecross Arts Limited for the year ended 31 March 2015 which comprise the Consolidated and parent company Statement of Financial Activities, Consolidated and parent company Balance Sheets and related notes. As described in the statement of Trustees' responsibilities, the Trustees, who are also the directors of Horsecross Arts Limited for the purposes of company law, are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and for being satisfied that the accounts give a true and fair view.

We have been appointed as auditor under section 44(1) (c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and report in accordance with regulations made under that Act.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). 1. Principal accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised 2005), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

Going concern

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis following assessment by the directors of the group's financial position at the date of approval which included consideration of forward revenue and cash flow projections for the next 12 months.

Horsecross Arts' viability is critically dependent on the continuance of financial support from its principal funders, Perlh & Kinross Council and Creative Scotland, and on the adequacy of its income generating endeavours in relation to charitable trading activities (which are primarily cultural and educational) and other fund-raising.

The board has reviewed operating revenue and cash flow forecasts prepared by management on the basis of approved income and expenditure budgets, with due allowance made for timing factors associated with grants, box office and other trading receipts.

Management's forecasts indicate the adequacy of working capital to allow the group to continue to pay its debts as they fall due during the period to June 2016. Accordingly, and in view of the confirmed funding agreements in place for 2015-16 with Perth & Kinross Council and Creative Scotland, the board is satisfied that the group can continue to trade as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

Basis of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary Perth Theatre Catering Services Limited on a line by line basis.

As described in note 13 Horsecross Arts is deemed to be a subsidiary undertaking of its ultimate parent, Perth & Kinross Council. Accordingly, the financial statements of Perth & Kinross Council will incorporate the results of Horsecross Arts and its trading subsidiary.

Comparatives

The accounting policy is to include resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered. The comparative figures have been reclassified on this basis which has no effect on the level of reserves.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income

Voluntary income comprises all incoming resources from donations, legacies, grants – including those which provide core funding or are of a general nature provided by government and charitable foundations – and theatre subscriptions.

Voluntary income is recognised in the appropriate fund on a receivable basis when any conditions for receipts are met.

Where donor imposed conditions require that the resource is expanded in a future accounting period, income is recorded as deferred income at the Balance Sheet date.

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources (continued)

Where incoming resources are given specifically to provide a fixed asset, or a fixed asset is donated, all of the incoming resource is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Once the asset is acquired the relevant fund is reduced over the useful economic life of the asset in line with its depreciation

Activities for generating funds

Activities for generating funds comprise income from: conferencing, catering, commercial sponsorships, box office commissions and booking fees, merchandise and other retail activities. Such income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Incoming resources from charitable activities

Incoming resources from charitable activities: box office sales and other production income, creative learning and community programme participation fees and local authority service fees.

Box office and other production income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities on maturity of the performance or event.

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accrual basis, inclusive of any Value Added Tax which cannot be recovered.

Cost of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the staging of concerts, stage productions, art exhibitions and educational programmes and include both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with the constitutional and statutory requirements. Also included is an estimate of the cost of senior management time and other resources expended on long-term strategy and financial planning activities.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financiał Activities as incurred over the lease term.

Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

for the year ended 31 March 2015

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets over £100 with a useful life of more than one year are capitalised and held at cost less accumulated depreciation with the relevant fund.

Depreciation is provided to write off fixed assets over their anticipated useful economic lives and is charged to the relevant fund as follows:

Leasehold property
Plant and machinery
Fixtures, fittings & equipment

over the duration of the lease on a straight line basis

over 2 to 10 years on a straight line basis over 4 to 5 years on a reducing balance method

The material costs of sets, props and costumes for use in productions are written off in full in the year in which the performance first falls.

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Investments

The charity's investment in its wholly owned subsidiary is included in the charity's balance sheet at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Stock

Stock held by Horsecross Arts' trading subsidiary comprises food and beverage and other catering supplies for resale. Other stock comprises consumables for use in the making of sets and costumes.

All stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is based on the latest purchase price for catering stock, and on actual cost for production stock.

Pensions

The charity is a member of the Tayside Superannuation Fund ('the Fund'), a defined benefit pension scheme.

Horsecross Arts is unable to identify its share of assets and liabilities of the Fund on a consistent and reasonable basis and accounts for its obligations in respect of the Fund as a defined contribution scheme, in accordance with the provisions of Financial Reporting Standard No. 17 (Retirement Benefits).

Contributions to the fund are determined by periodic actuarial valuations using the 'projected unit' method.

Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption allowed by Financial Reporting Standard No.1 (Revised) (Cash Flows Statements).

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are those funds which can be used for any appropriate charitable purpose, within the objects of the charily, at the discretion of the board.

Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

for the year ended 31 March 2015

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Restricted funds may only be used in accordance with the specific wishes of donors.

Taxation

Horsecross Arts is a culturally exempt organisation under Schedule 9 of the VAT Act 1994. During the year VAT returns have been submitted on a culturally exempt basis.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the cost of charitable activities, where it is incurred. Irrecoverable VAT on capital expenditure is capitalised and written off over the life of the assets.

Horsecross Arts is a registered charity and therefore is not liable to income tax and corporation tax on income and gains derived from its charitable activities as it falls within the various exemptions available to registered charities.

The subsidiary company has an obligation to covenant any available taxable profits up to Horsecross Arts under Gift Aid.

16. Pension and other post-retirement commitments

Horsecross Arts Limited is a member of the Tayside Superannuation Fund, a defined benefit scheme with the assets held in separate trustee administered funds. Contributions payable by the company to the scheme amounted to £130,044 (2014: £125,541).

In view of the fact that contributions to the scheme are currently established on a scheme-wide basis and that Horsecross Arts' share of the scheme assets is only derived on a notional basis and has no impact on Horsecross Arts' contribution rates as an employer, the Truslees are of the view that the scheme should be accounted for as if it were a defined contribution scheme under the requirements of FRS 17 (Retirement Benefits). The cost recognised within the statement of financial activities is equal to the contributions payable to the scheme for the year.

During the year the company set up a second defined contribution pension scheme. This NEST scheme is an alternative to the local government scheme. Contributions payable by the company to the scheme amounted to £10,077 (2014: nil).

19. Related parties

Substantial funding is received from Perth & Kinross Council by way of grants and service level fees for general purposes and other activities. Perth & Kinross Council is also Horsecross Arts' landlord at Perth Theatre and Perth Concert Hall, the principal premises from which Horsecross Arts operates and carries on its charitable purposes.

Furthermore, following changes to governance arrangements made in 2013, Perth & Kinross Council is now the sole member of Horsecross Arts. As sole member, Perth & Kinross Council has certain powers of control, which are set out in the Articles, including the right to nominate up to 3 elected members of the Council to serve on the board of directors, as well as to decide on the appointment and removal of all other directors and to control appointments to the office of Chair.

Given the degree of control and influence which exists in the funding, operational and governance relationship, 100% of Horsecross Arts' general funds and net assets are consolidated in Perth & Kinross Council's annual group accounts, in accordance with financial reporting and accounting standards and other regulations applicable to local authorities delivering services through arm's length external organisations.
