#### WORKING IN LOCALITIES TO TACKLE INEQUALITY

#### Joint Report by Senior Depute Chief Executive, ECS (Equality, Community Planning & Public Services Reform) and Depute Chief Executive, HCC (Corporate and Community Development)

#### PURPOSE OF REPORT

This report lays out proposals to build upon existing activity aimed at making Perth & Kinross a more fair and equitable place to live. Our aim is to change people's lives using legislation, evidence and experience. Stubborn inequalities exist and it is our challenge to address these through a fairness agenda.

Evidence has been gathered which provides an up to date profile of inequality in Perth & Kinross. This evidence, which has largely been gathered via 'desk top' research, is an important starting point to inform future measures to tackle inequality. It is however, important that this evidence is built upon through robust engagement with key stakeholders such as those people working in localities and, **vitally**, with people currently experiencing relative inequality in terms of income, health and employment opportunities.

#### 1. BACKGROUND / MAIN ISSUES

- 1.1 Addressing inequalities and promoting social inclusion through prevention and early intervention is at the heart of the Scottish Government's legislative programme and the Fairer Scotland Agenda, as well as the Council's Corporate Plan and the Perth & Kinross Community Plan/Single Outcome Agreement. A report entitled "Shifting the Curve", (http://thirdsectorcommunity.org.uk/News/shifting-the-curve) prepared by independent advisors to the Scottish Government, has recently added to the debate on how to tackle stubborn inequalities in Scotland.
- 1.2 Although Perth & Kinross is considered to be a mainly affluent area, in reality many individuals and families across both our urban and rural communities are affected by inequality in relation to income, health and employment opportunities.
- 1.3 However, the geography of poverty is changing. Poverty is no longer concentrated in particular areas, meaning traditional approaches to identifying and tackling poverty and inequality such as the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation, can no longer give a complete picture, particularly with regard to people living in our rural communities. It is important to remember that individuals and families suffer from poverty and inequality, not whole geographical areas, and not only those outwith employment. It is also important to gather evidence on how experiences of urban/rural poverty are felt by those individuals and families

- 1.4 Evidence based practice already exists in Perth & Kinross in relation to addressing inequalities (Appendix 1). This includes extensive work from the Welfare Rights Team, Children & Families Team, NHS Tayside, Citizens Advice Bureau and Partner Organisations. The Evidence to Success programme is an example where the gathering and testing of robust evidence has informed the development and delivery of effective practice and achievement of better outcomes for individuals and families in Perth & Kinross.
- 1.5 Another example of the evidence of the impact of inequality is through the analysis of health and social care data across Perth & Kinross The evidence suggests a higher consumption of health and social care resource within those communities that are generally less deprived. This is further explained by the higher presence of multi-morbidities affecting adults in less affluent communities, reducing longevity and therefore ultimately the ability to access services.
- 1.6 At its meeting on 7 October 2015 (Article 646 refers) the Council agreed the following motion The Poverty Alliance is the national anti-poverty network in Scotland and has offered valuable advice to the Perth and Kinross Council Welfare Rights staff to tackle the causes and consequences of poverty in Perth and Kinross.

As part of the national campaign to combat stigma, the Poverty Alliance has, in the run up to Challenge Poverty week later this month, invited Councils to sign up to the national "Stick Your Labels" campaign. The objective of the campaign is to tackle negative attitudes and challenge stereotypes about people experiencing poverty. The Campaign has been supported by the Scottish Government, CoSLA and Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations.

Perth & Kinross Council pledges to:

- 1 Set out its contribution and commitment to tackling poverty in our area.
- 2 Avoid language which can cause harm to people experiencing poverty or stigmatise those living in poverty.
- 3 Develop and take actions that will address negative attitudes towards people experiencing poverty.

Council agrees to request that the Chief Executive brings forward a detailed report on addressing poverty and the above pledges within Perth and Kinross.

1.7 This report proposes an approach to build upon existing evidence based activity addressing inequalities across the different localities of Perth & Kinross.

# 2 PROPOSALS

- 2.1 The CPP Board has new statutory duties to tackle stubborn inequality in the CPP area and set out how it proposes to do this in a Local Outcome Improvement Plan (LOIP). In effect the current Community Plan will evolve into the LOIP although the current Community Plan will require refreshing and updating to ensure it demonstrates how the CPP will fulfil this new statutory duty.
- 2.2 At its meeting held on 16 December 2015, the Council approved a future approach to locality working. A key component of this approach is the establishment of Local Community Planning Partnerships to oversee the development of Locality Planning, including tackling inequalities, for which they are accountable to the CPP Board. The nature of the challenge before us requires a progressive and collaborative approach with a range of stakeholders.
- 2.3 It is proposed that these Local Community Planning Partnerships would lead local community engagement/conversations with regards to building upon the existing evidence based in relation to poverty and other inequalities. The local CPPs would engage with local people gathering views on what practical initiatives could be put in place using the existing best practice as examples of things that work and testing views and perceptions locally.
- 2.4 A number of formal Poverty Commissions have been held across Scotland providing reports in recent months, namely Renfrewshire Council (Child Poverty), Fife and Dundee. The Senior Depute Chief Executive has visited Renfrewshire and this visit has helped in shaping the proposals in this report.
- 2.5 Whilst the outputs from these Commissions have been helpful in informing existing activity in Perth & Kinross, it is suggested the most vital component of future joint working to address inequalities locally should be the involvement of local people currently facing inequalities on a daily basis.
- 2.6 Following Perth & Kinross's significant contribution to the Scottish National Action Plan for Human Rights, and the Council's decision to promote a better human rights culture in Perth & Kinross through a Statement of Intent Making <u>Human Rights a Reality in Perth & Kinross</u> our intention is to deliver on our aim for a Perth & Kinross where everyone is treated with dignity and respect and where everyone has the right to opportunities and to prosper.

# 3. NEXT STEPS

3.1 As outlined above, tackling inequality and addressing poverty are shared priorities within our Community Plan/SOA and the solutions to addressing such multi-faceted issues lie in multi-faceted partnership solutions. It is therefore further suggested that a Fairness Commission be established to build consensus across public organisations, employers and communities of

the need to tackle stubborn inequality. The consensus will be informed by the authentic view of those people experiencing hardship through inequality.

- 3.2 The purpose of the Commission is to build public and political support for actions to improve the lives of children, families and individuals. The Commission will give strategic direction and identify agreed actions with community representatives to tackle inequality. The Commission's conclusions and recommendations will inform the priorities of the Council and the Community Planning Partnership Board. The Board will oversee engagement within localities and the further development of appropriate joint activity to address poverty and inequality within local community planning partnership areas.
- 3.3 The proposed Commission would have a finite life and a short, sharp focus and would regularly report progress to the Council and the CPP Board. It is suggested that membership of the Commission be drawn from :
  - Local people/organisations with first-hand experience of poverty and inequalities
  - An elected member
  - CPP Partner
  - An academic
  - Representative from local Third Sector e.g. Citizens Advice
  - Representative from Joseph Rowntree Foundation or Poverty Alliance
  - A Trade Union Rep
  - Senior Depute Chief Executive

The remit of the Commission will be to:

- Take evidence in the areas of early years, educational attainment, health inequalities, employment, skills, housing and income,
- Give a voice to the authentic experience of individuals who experience inequalities,
- Provide a report to the CPP and the Council on proposals for change that will address poverty
- 3.4 It is imperative that particular emphasis should be given to ensuring local people/organisations with first-hand experience of poverty/inequalities have a lead role in the Fairness Commission, therefore an appropriate individual with first hand experience of poverty should jointly chair the commission along side an elected member.

3.5 A suggested timetable for this activity is outlined below:-

#### 4. **RESOURCING**

4.1 The engagement in localities would be led by the Community Development Teams. It is also suggested that third sector organisations with a focus on addressing inequalities e.g. Joseph Rowntree Foundation, STAR Project, Poverty Alliance, could be approached with a view to providing support through a six month secondment of an appropriate specialist to lead and coordinate the activity outlined within this draft report.

#### 5. THE POVERTY ALLIANCE

5.1 The Poverty Alliance is a network of community, voluntary and statutory organisations working together to combat poverty. The Poverty Alliance campaign "Stick your Labels" aims to tackle the stigma of poverty. The Scottish Government, COSLA and eight local authorities have signed up to the campaign. The motion agreed by the Council on 7 October 2015 included reference to the campaign, and in signing up to the Campaign the Council will demonstrate its commitment to tackling poverty as well as benefit from entering into partnership with the Poverty Alliance this will provide access to their specialist expertise and support in developing our engagement activity across localities.

# 6. CONCLUSION AND RECOMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Council agree to:-

- 1) Approve the establishment of a Fairness Commission as outlined in Section 3;
- 2) Approve the suggested approach and the timetable also as outlined in Section 3;
- 3) Note the examples of evidence-based practice (Appendix 1) as the basis for further engagement within localities; and
- 4) Sign up to the Poverty Alliance's "Stick your Labels" campaign.
