I attended Logierait Primary from P1-P7 my grandparents could see the school from their living room window and when the bell went would often watch us all at play. My 2 brothers and my sister also went there. We all only had a few minutes to walk to be at the school

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door. The school is very much a part of village life with families often having more than one generation on the school roll.

Since leaving Logierait Primary I studied at Breadalbane and went to Ravensbourne University in London to study a degree in Sound Design hoping to pursue a career in sound for film and tv. Since then I have gone on to work on various projects one of which has been nominated for a BAFTA.

After leaving Logierait and working my way through Pitlochry High and Breadalbane Academy I spent 7 years working in construction before joining Tayside Police where I served over 30 years retiring as the Pitlochry sergeant having spent half my career in Highland Perthshire. In 2002 I was awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours for "Services to the Police in Perth and Kinross." I live in Glasgow but go home regularly.

Paul Sherriffs

Since leaving Logierait I progressed through Pitlochry High School prior to moving to Breadalbane Academy before leaving to study Forensic Sciences at Abertay University. I graduated second in my year with an upper second class BSc (Hons) degree in 2017 whilst also being awarded the Lothian family award for having the greatest impact within the school of science, engineering and technology. Subsequently, I have enrolled on as PhD student at Abertay where I research fingermark enhancement techniques as well as the interactions between the fingermarks and complex surfaces. After attending Logierait Primary, I went on to attend Pitlochry High School. Due to the interaction with the various other primary schools in the area before high school (Blair Atholl and Grandtully primaries) I felt ready to take on the challenges of high school. After completing my Standard Grades, I moved to Breadalbane Academy where I obtained my Highers and Advanced Highers. This allowed me to then move onto Aberdeen University where I gained a degree in Immunology and Pharmacology with Biobusiness (Hons). From Aberdeen I went on to Oxford to work on my PhD, identifying potential health risks diesel exhaust particles and fuel additives have for asthmatics in a joint project with Imperial

I am now a respiratory toxicologist working in Swansea University on a European Project worth €12.7m with partners throughout the world. This project aims to develop a lung model that can potentially replace the use of animals in nanoparticle toxicity testing.

Throughout my career I have had the opportunity to present my work all over both the UK and Europe and have had the confidence to continue to move further and further away from home! Without the foundations and skills that Logierait Primary had supplied me with there is no way I would be where I am now.

I still enjoy coming back home and driving past that school where I learned how to play "hopscotch", "stuck in the mud" and how to finally skip properly. Where I learned my first computer skills and helped design an "eco-garden". Where I learned how to play the recorder (and in addition how to torture my family with my "practising"); how to play netball; how to be a member of a team and a responsible member of society.

I still keep in contact with lifelong friends I made in that school and regularly see them even though there is 500miles between us now!

Kerry (Meldrum) Smith

I am an ex pupil of Logierait Primary School, between 1983 and 1990. I was a very quiet and shy girl but really shone when I used to sing and read Gaelic, at the Mod. If it wasn't for that school, and its teaching and encouragement, I would still be a shy girl. My proudest moment was when I won the reading twice, and came 4th in solo singing twice. Having small classes in the same classroom really helps with development, I never felt left out, and always had one on one teaching if needed, and I knew everyone because of the close knit community, so you always had a friend, and older kids looking after you. I have now just turned 40 and working as a Accounts Assistant.

Margaret Ross

I have attached two pictures, one is of my brothers and myself in a school photograph taken at Logierait School in the early nineteen fifties the other is one of a picture taken when my mother was at school (she is 5th from the right the serious girl with the large bow in her hair). She would, I think, have been about 7 when this was taken so the date would be approximately 1917. Her two brothers and her sister also went to the village school. My family have had four generations of pupils attending this school and have all received a superb education and a good foundation to further our education at what we used to refer to as the "big school" namely the high school.

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I believe my grandmother went there also though I do not have any evidence of this. My niece also attended this school and there are still members of my family attending Logierait School today.

I have happy memories of my tie there and really appreciate the care that was taken to provide me with a high standard of education.

I am a member of a local group who visit the school regularly and take part in activities with them and the standard of education the children receive is still of a very high standard today. The local school, along with the Church and the Post Office, shop etc. are at the heart of the village and without them the village dies. Ballinluig and surrounding areas are regenerating and if there is no school it is one of the things that will put off young families from settling in the area and this is of particular concern as there is a planning application for a further 15 family houses to be built in the village
