- Where the CYP is accommodated, part of a rehab or transitions plan.
- Where the CYP will be moving home or between placements.
- To agree and support any contact arrangements.
- To safely plan for a new baby.

Who can refer?

- With the family's permission, professionals or teams in a caseholding role may refer to FGDM.
- Referrers must be prepared to see the FGDM process through.
- Family members themselves can prompt referrals.



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What is Family Group Decision-Making?

- Family Group Decision-Making (FGDM)
 is a strengths-based approach which is
 designed to empower families to make
 a safe plan when there are concerns
 about a child or young person (CYP).
- It is a **structured** process that leads to a Family Group Meeting; helping families to **identify** their own strengths and solutions.
- FGDM creates an environment where young people and their family's voices are heard; it enables families and their support network to make safe and unique plans by working together.
- The process is led by an independent co-ordinator who is not involved in any statutory decision-making or case holding. Their role is to prepare the CYP, their family and extended network to come together to make a family plan. The co-ordinator is available to the family and the referrer throughout the process.
- FGDM is highly recommended as an early intervention where statutory processes may be required.

- FGDM can run alongside statutory processes and can help families to prepare a plan in advance of a LAC Review, CPCC and Children's Hearings. It has been proven to even help families divert from the Children's Hearing system.
- FGDM is entirely voluntary. Referrers must seek a family's consent and approval before referring to the service.

Why FGDM?

- Article 12 of The Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014 names FGDM as a relevant service which Local Authorities must provide to families.
- Scotland's children and young people
 have told us that they feel special when
 their families come together to listen to
 them.
- Families are experts on themselves and are often the best people to make plans for their CYP.
- FGDM is blame-free and futurefocussed; it is an opportunity to repair fractured family relationships, to improve and grow a CYP's network of support.

Aims:

"Where children are safe in their families and feel loved they must stay" The Promise, page 6

- FGDM aims to puts CYP and their families at the heart of the decisionmaking process, listen to their views, experiences and hopes.
- FGDM aims to provide early and effective support services to prevent children and young people unnecessarily entering the formal care system.
- FGDM ensures whole family support, enabling families to overcome the difficulties that get in the way of them keeping their family together.

When to refer?

- When a CYP and their family need a plan for support or a decision which involves practical partnership between family members and professionals.
- Where the CYP may be referred to the reporter.
- Where a family plan is needed in relation to the CYP's safety and protection.
- Where the CYP may be accommodated.
