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
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Emotion Works at Dunbarney Nursery



When we first began our emotion works journey at Dunbarney nursery, we took time to consider how we could ensure that the children had meaningful ways of learning about emotion 'experiences' through their everyday play and learning with their friends. We value the emotion works programme as much as numeracy and literacy and fully appreciate its importance in life long outcomes for our children as they grow and develop. We spent time creating spaces around the room which naturally allowed the children to freely express their feelings in a safe and age appropriate manner with the use of emotion works symbols and other props such as emotion cubes, feelings tree, emotions mirror, emotion spoons and lanyards to name a few. We have seen the positive impact that it is having on our children on a daily basis and how the children are able to use a wide range of emotion words and symbols. A recent survey was sent out to parents and the feedback was very positive and encouraging that the children were more confident in naming their emotions and feelings.

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Intergenerational Peep Pilot Group

The Parent and Family learning Team pilotted an Intergenerational Peep programme to allow participants to learn new skills, share experiences across generations and reduce loneliness/isolation. The aim of the joint venture was to create an age inclusive Intergenerational Peep group where the toddlers, parents and tenants could build relationships, feel more socially connected and increase their confidence and wellbeing.

According to Beth Johnson Foundation (a charity dedicated to making the UK age-friendly), "Intergenerational practice is inclusive, building on the positive resources that the younger and older persons have to offer to each other and those around them." Intergenerational learning creates opportunities for all generations to feel valued and part of their community and we felt linking this to the Peep LTP provided the ideal environment to build reciprocal learning relationships. Intergenerational learning was also included in the Housing and Communities Team'



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Training opportunity - ELC Nurture Programme 'Nurturing Relationships' for funded providers

We are delighted to extend our 'Nurturing Relationships Programme' offer to our funded providers this year. The training course aims to promote a universal understanding of the key concepts which underpin the PKC Nurturing Relationships approach within Early Learning establishments and childcare providers.

PKC Nurturing Relationships team are delighted to offer a 6-month training programme for practitioners within ELC partner provider settings. The training offers an introduction to the key theory which underpins nurturing approaches and the Six Nurture Principles.

Course delivery:

Each of the four modules has been designed for flexible completion and should take approximately 2 hours per module to complete, with a mix of short videos, supplementary reading materials and evaluative forms. Each module will conclude with a reflective session which will be hosted by the Nurturing Relationships and Early Years teams.

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New Forest Kindergarten training dates



Perth and Kinross Council in partnership with Perth College run a number of Forest Kindergarten training.

This qualification is run via learning materials which take a flipped classroom approach followed by an intense 3 day outdoor experience.

This qualification meets the needs of practitioners who would like to set up regular off-site visits to a local wood or nearby green space for children in their care. The National Work-based Award in Forest Kindergarten at SCQF level 7 recognises the value of woodlands as an integral part of the learning process for children and covers the knowledge, understanding and skills needed to develop a forest kindergarten.

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Care Inspectorate

School aged childcare services feasibility study

The Care Inspectorate and the Scottish Government will soon begin work on a joint project to undertake a feasibility study to consider future regulation and inspection of school aged childcare services (SACC). The project will build on the broader work of the SACC Programme and on feedback from the sector, children and families, on issues around regulation and quality.

The aim of the project is to understand what changes could be made to the regulation of SACC to expand the current system, enabling a wider range of services to be considered in the scope of SACC, and creating a more level playing field for service providers. The study will seek to highlight implications of any proposed changes whilst ensuring that SACC provision across Scotland is sustainable, affordable and of high quality, for those families who rely on it.

The study will commence in August and will last for six months. Look out for further updates in the provider update and across our social media.

The team has developed a series of six information guides in relation to the Health and Care (Staffing) (Scotland) Act. The guides are available on the safe staffing hub areas for **adults**, **early learning and childcare** and **children and young people**. The guides have been produced to support managers and senior staff in registered care services who are engaged in workload assessment/planning and inspectors evaluating services.
