"Cook & Connect ran a series of cooking sessions at Strathearn Community Campus designed for men aged 60+ who had little to no cooking experience. The aim of the sessions was to bring men together to learn new skills and connect with others in their community. Sessions were relaxed and designed to give the knowledge and confidence needed to enjoy cooking whilst gaining an understanding of healthier food. These sessions taught life skills such as budgeting, planning, cooking whilst providing social interaction with others.

Participants were involved in planning recipes, sharing the preparation, cooking and clearing up. Once the dishes had been made we sat down and ate together. The act of creating a dish followed by communal eating resulted in a sense of achievement, new friendships forming and conversations around food. The group was very engaged and everyone participated with gusto!"

"Moncreiffe Church wanted to open their doors to the community and be able to offer support, signposting and opportunities after their soup kitchen closed during Covid and never recovered. This was primarily due to costs and lack of volunteers. They wanted to open up a small café to support those struggling with the cost of living offering free home cooked meals, soup and sandwiches. For the café to operate they needed to look at recruiting volunteers and making sure that people were trained in Food Hygiene and policies, apply for funding and get permission from the church kirk session.

Relationships with key partners enabled support at a local level to address issues. Support included - REHIS 1 training (NHS), Policy and Practices, Funding, Adult Learning, Volunteering, (CLD Team), supply of surplus homegrown fruit & vegetables (local organisations) and child protection & first aid training (Safer Communities Team). The café has added an extra day to operate through community voices being heard and listened to."

Locality Participatory Budgeting Fund - Case Study

Background: £100,000 was available to communities to support projects that tackle the cost-of-living within four targeted areas: Central & North Perth; Rattray; South Crieff; and Coupar Angus, Meigle & Alyth.

Approach: 8 primary schools were provided with resources and took part in voting in the classroom. Local youth organisations carried out voting drop-ins within 2 high schools. Schools also encouraged wider community involvement by promoting on social media, at parent contact evenings, and sending voting papers home in school bags.

Impact: 799 children and young people aged 5 -17 years voted. School staff reported that children and young people showed enthusiasm for learning about local projects and enjoyed being involved in making decisions to support projects that matter to them.

ADVANCING COMMUNITY ASSETS FUND

"Royal Voluntary Service (RVS) applied to PKC for a community minibus and were successful in receiving a minibus in April 2025. RVS will use the minibus to increase the number of vulnerable and elderly residents of Perth and Kinross attending regular lunch and social clubs. They hope this will help improve loneliness and mental wellbeing.

David Reilly, service manager with the Royal Voluntary Service, said the organisation's new minibus would help combat social isolation. He said: "We are absolutely delighted. We support the elderly in Perth and Kinross and organise outings once a year - this will let us do it once a week instead."

Bigger plans now that the group own a minibus include regular daytrips for service users and even starting a Perth and Kinross Boccia league where elderly residents from across P&K can come together to socialise and keep active."
